If you're doing your paddling in Club kayaks, please remember to respect them. I've been hearing some awful tales about boats being dragged over the ground from the boat shed to the water. Remember, our spies are everywhere.

Please also could you be aware that boat hire is not the primary objective of our Club. What I mean by this is that you are only supposed to hire our boats a couple of times, while getting used to the idea of kayaking, and then you should really get your own boat. Club hire is not intended to be a long term proposition. Apart from anything else this puts too much strain on our fleet.

Also you'll be aware that Committee members who help out with hireage and also spend a considerable amount of time repairing and generally maintaining the kayaks are only volunteers and are not at your continual beck and call. No, Bruce cannot be at the boatshed to help you get your boat out, and no, he cannot come to your house to deliver your chosen craft. Contrary to some beliefs, the Club does not possess a trailer which can be used to transport boats around.

We have decided to change the hire system slightly. The new system is that full payment must be made to Bruce Bugbee before hire is possible. Full payment must be made to secure a booking - this does not apply to Club nights - more on that later. You can phone Bruce first to ensure a kayak is available tel 570 1134. This is his work phone number, so please no calls in the evening or at weekends. His address for remittances is 1 Mason St, New Lynn.

On Club nights hire is still on a first come best dressed basis with payment to be left in the shed. However please do not hog your favourite boat too much, and regard use of Club boats as an interim measure only.

Hire rates have been simplified as follows:

- * Club nights \$5 per seat.
- * Saturday- anytime finishing before noon \$10 for the duration, anytime starting after noon \$10 for the duration. If your hire crosses noon then you pay \$20 for a full day, no exceptions.

On sea swim escort days - Feb 20 and March 12 this year, all boats are reserved for swim escort purposes.

Dawning of the new Millennium By Rona Patterson

Auckland Canoe Club members, families and friends started arriving at the clubrooms from 9 pm on Friday 31 December 1999 with kayaks, bedrolls, food, drink streamers and anything else deemed necessary to see in the new millennium. Some of us had planned to base ourselves in the clubhouse and walk to other venues during the night, but the weather played havoc with most of these plans. It was 2.30 am before people started creeping into their sleeping bags but sleep was elusive for most. All of a sudden the word was out that the wind and rain had dropped and the race was on to get boats onto the water. More club members had joined us and we set off on what was an almost eerie experience, paddling over to Torpedo Bay in the silent darkness. Any craft coming near us, stopped - even the Quick Cat.

More paddlers joined the group at Torpedo Bay, and in the dark we were not to know who they were. By this time our group was very large and we headed around North Head to wait for the Waka. We waited, and waited. It was daylight and we were still waiting. The Waka did not appear, so we hastened back across the harbour.

There in front of us were hundreds of craft lining the outside of the wind break and guns were being fired from Bastion Point. By this time I was overcome by the whole experience – we were so tiny beside the other craft and it was silent all around. We slid through between all manner of craft and moved right up, almost to the beach. What a sight! Thousands and thousands of people, a haka in process, speeches, maori in ceremonial dress, and then the sun peeped over the hill and remained out for about ten minutes. (Wouldn't you know it - a magical moment and no camera)

Once it was all over there was nowhere to land. Our boat ramp was a seething mass of people - right down to the water. However, once they had gone, it was time for us to get the barbecue fired up and start yet another celebration.

What a night!

Auckland Sea Kayakers Internet Discussion List

An email discussion list called 'Auckland Sea Kayakers', pertaining particularly to sea kayaking in the Auckland area, for sea kayakers in the Auckland Sea Kayak Network (ASKNet) and the Auckland Canoe Club has been created on the Internet. As a member of either of these organisations, you are invited to subscribe to this list. This has been done using eGroup.com and will make it very much easier for communication amongst sea kayakers.

A discussion list provides for email communication between all subscribers on the list. Any member can post a message to the list, and that message will be sent (or optionally made available) to all list subscribers. Any member can send a reply back to the list which is again sent to all members. All messages are available on the Auckland Sea Kayakers website:

Another major facility is the events calendar. All trips are posted on the calendar at the Auckland Sea Kayakers website. Any member can view the calendar and view a list of upcoming events. An reminder for some trips will be automatically sent to all subscribers a couple of days before the event (so you know what's happening on the weekend).

There are a number of other benefits such as on-line chat or talk with members, poll surveys, a library of relevant files, and links to other websites. There is no charge for all this however egroup.com gets its payback by allowing advertising (although this does not seem to be intrusive).

The race is open to all forms of paddle powered craft which means the fast K1 and Multisport Kayaks will be there as well as Outrigger Craft. But it is also ideally suited for our single and double Sea Kayaks as most of the course is on the harbour.

Starting and finishing on the beach at Judges Bay the 16km course runs along the coast to St Heliers and back with a short loop in Hobson Bay to make up the distance. A large part of the course will be familiar to our regular Saturday series paddlers.

Good trophies are presented to the winners in the various categories and yes there will be awards for both single and double Sea Kayaks. A tasty BBQ with something cool to drink is part of the entry fee and everyone has a chance to win one of the many spot prizes.

The race is on Sunday 27th February, starting at 1pm and you can enter on the day for \$15 (no late fee). Everyone starts together and its a good value for money event that some of the other race organisers could learn a lesson from.



VENUE

The venue this year is Puriri Park Holiday Complex at the north end of Centreway Road in Orewa. It is a lovely, peaceful location, with bush walks and a dairy/takeaway. It is only a short drive from Auckland now that the motorway goes all the way to Orewa. Delegates have the option of commuting, or staying in the Park.

Puriri Park has a modern conference centre for our slide presentations and workshops, as well as a bar and dining area. A

feature of the Park is a 25 metre pool where we will have our practical demonstrations. There is also a large barn where home-built kayaks and other DIY goodies and gadgets will be on display.

Orewa itself offers a wonderful beach (5 minutes walk from the Park) and shopping areas. It is strategically situated near the beautiful Mahurangi region and only a short drive to Sullivans Bay where we will depart for Motuora Island on the Sunday.

COST

There is a flat charge for Coastbusters 2000 of \$89 per person. This covers: all symposium activities, including morning tea and lunch on Saturday, and dinner Saturday evening, plus the barbecue on Motuora Island. There is no daily or event rate - one charge fits all!

Please note too that you are responsible for your own breakfasts Sat/Sun, and your own accommodation. Tent sites are available at Puriri Park (no booking required) for \$10 per night. Cabins may also be booked, phone (09) 426 6396.

Payments for camping, and cabin bookings/payments must be made directly with Puriri Park management. You must check into the Puriri Park Office when you arrive, and indicate that you are attending Coastbusters. Then check in with us at the Conference Centre where you will receive your name tag plus your Saturday evening dinner ticket, plus further information.


Saturday Evening
